Goal: All providers use electronic prescribing and actively manage controlled substance prescriptions

Full e-prescribing system is in place and actively in use by all physicians

All providers at Munson Family Practice are e-prescribing through the NextGen EMR system.

PCP and Specialist Guidelines:

- All practitioners routinely use an e-prescribing system for all prescriptions for non-controlled substances
- E-prescribing system meets Medicare requirement standards

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8.8***Electronic prescribing system is routinely used to prescribe controlled substances***

Munson Family Practice has a contract with a third party to authenticate the controlled substances prescribed called Symantec



Symantec gives a code to send to the pharmacy with the controlled substance prescription for authentication.

PCP and Specialist Guidelines:

- c. All practitioners routinely use an e-prescribing system to prescribe controlled substances system to prescribe controlled substances



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8.9***Michigan Automated Prescription System (MAPS) reports are routinely run prior to prescribing controlled substances***

Munson Family Practice runs a MAPS report on all new patients and yearly on patients who are prescribed controlled substances for longer than 30-60 days. The MAPS report is scanned into the patients EMR record after review.

PCP and Specialist Guidelines:

- a. All practitioners run MAPS reports prior to prescribing controlled substances, and follow-up with patient if any concerns are identified

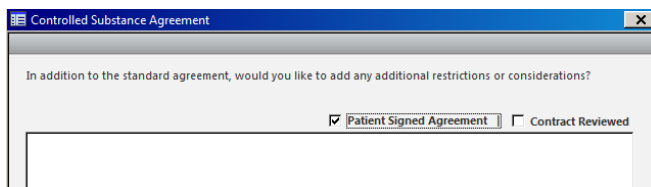

Controlled Substance Agreements are in place for all patients with long-term controlled substance prescriptions



Munson Family Practice initiates the controlled substance agreement for patients who are prescribed controlled substances for longer than 30-60 days. The controlled substance agreement is signed by the patient and provider initially and then yearly after that if the patient is to continue on the controlled substance. The signed agreement is scanned into the patients EMR chart.



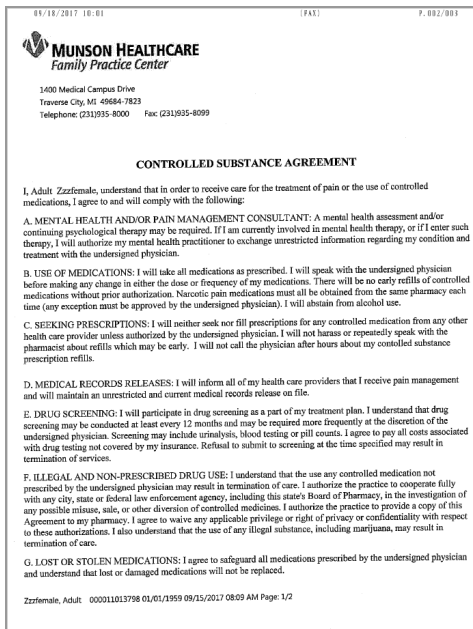
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PCP and Specialist Guidelines:
 a. All practitioners ensure that patients with controlled substance prescriptions for longer than 30-60 days have a Controlled Substance Agreement in place
