HPV - 2 or 3?

Good news, everyone! On a statewide level the HPV vaccine coverage rate has increased from **29% to 36%.** This is great news for cancer prevention as HPV accounts for over 30,000 cases of cancer each year (CDC.gov).

This increase in rates follows a change in the immunization schedule for teens. The new schedule decreases the recommendation from 3 shots to 2 for certain age groups and should make it easier for teens and parents to complete the series! The new schedule recommendations are below:

- For persons initiating vaccination before age 15, the recommended immunization schedule is 2 doses of HPV vaccine at 0, 6-12 months
- For persons initiating vaccination at age 15 years or older, the recommended immunization schedule is 3 doses of HPV vaccine at 0, 1-2, 6 months.

The update to a 2 dose schedule for girls and boys who initiate the vaccination series at ages 9 through 14 years was determined at the October meeting for the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP). To increase immunization rates even further with this new schedule we encourage you to give a **strong recommendation** for the HPV vaccination to every eligible patient. Remember, it is best for this vaccination to be given around ages 11-12 before exposure to HPV occurs.

Why is this campaign important?

- Michigan ranks <u>43rd lowest</u> in the U.S. for immunization coverage among children 19 -35 months old.
- The CDC estimates that childhood vaccines prevent 20 million cases of disease and save 42,000 lives every year.
- Every \$1 spent on vaccines saves \$3 in medical care costs that are avoided.
